

2013, 126 min., in English with Czech subtitles DIR: Milan Cieslar

Arnošt Lustig, a Pulitzer Prize nominee, is one of the world's most renowned literary authors of our time. Lusting's novel *A Girl from Antwerp*, from which the film COLETTE is based, draws on his personal experiences while incarcerated at Auschwitz during the Second World War. COLETTE tells—in pure language of film—a tale of the power of love under extreme life circumstances. It is a story of a man and his vigorous determination to escape from a hopeless life condition and his courage to face death. Lustig immigrated to the United States in 1970 and was a professor of Literature at the American University in Washington, D.C., until his death in 2011.

About the Director:



Milan Cieslar has been directing films since 1985, and has been frequently represented at festivals with such audience favorites as *Dirty Soul* (2003), *Snowy Night* (2009), and *Love is Love* (2012). His film *Spring of Life*

(2000) won four international film awards. Cieslar is a film director and producer for Happy Celluloid, a film and TV production company established in 1994.





Honeymoon Líbánky

2013, 92 min., in Czech with English subtitles DIR: Jan Hřebejk (Meet the Director!)

A picture-perfect wedding in the Czech countryside is crashed by an uninvited guest whose past secrets shed a shadow over the festivities. The mysterious outsider claims to be a friend of the groom, but the groom denies knowing him. Winning the affection of guests, the enigmatic stranger delves into the bride's inner circle and makes her question her vows. Director Jan Hřebejk partners with award-winning screenwriter Petr Jarchovský and an all star cast, including Aňa Geislerová and Stanislav Majer, on this melodrama which garnered Hřebejk the award for best director at the Karlovy Vary International Film Festival (2013). About the Director:



Jan Hřebejk has made a name for himself amongst the top Czech and international directors with over 20 international awards and 14 nominations for his films. His film *Divided We Fall* (2000) won five Czech

Lion Awards and was nominated for an Oscar. At the Karlovy Vary International Film Festival 2013, he won the coveted award for the best director and was nominated for the Crystal Globe. His film *Kawasaki's Rose* (2009) was selected as the Czech entry for the Best Foreign Language Film at the Oscars. Some of his successful films include: *Cosy Dens* (1999), *Beauty in Trouble* (2006), *Innocence* (2011), among others.





Lousy Bastards Všiváci

June 11, 8 pm

2014, 100 min., in Czech with English subtitles DIR: Roman Kašparovský

This multi-layered story follows the lives of two brothers who separate after falling in love with the same girl. One brother is an expert in neurosurgery and lives a bohemian life in the capital. The other is a veteran who served in Afghanistan and takes care of his two daughters in a small village. Although they share the same origins and social backgrounds, their lifestyles are completely different. However, they do have one thing in common—a longing for love. The film was made under the auspices of Czech Defense Minister Alexandr Vondra and the military scenes were shot at the Czech military base in Afghanistan.

About the Director:



Roman Kašparovský graduated from the prestigious Film and Television Academy of the Performing Arts (FAMU) in Prague in 2006. He is an experienced producer and production manager, working on such films as *Restart* (2005),

Normal the Düsseldorf Ripper (2009), Mamas & Papas (2010), Seven Days of Sin (2012), and Lidice (2011). Kašparovský also serves as a producer for Axman Productions, an independent film production company founded in 2000, in the heart of Prague, Czech Republic. Lousy Bastards is Kašparovský's directorial debut.
