INTRODUCTION

This conference builds upon a successful meeting in February 2011 of experts and policy practitioners at the Association for International Affairs in Prague at which the challenges and opportunities facing EU-Russia relations were discussed.

This second meeting will focus on the prospects for a new strategic partnership between the EU and Russia. The aim will be to explore concrete steps which the Russian and European policy communities might take in order to build a more durable and meaningful partnership.

The conference will be divided into a plenary session with high-level key note speakers; and then two sessions focusing on political and economic cooperation ande prospects for a new strategic framework for the EU-Russia relationship.

INTENDED OUTCOME

The partners – the Association for International Affairs (AMO), the University of Birmingham (UoB) and the EU-Russia Centre – intend publishing a summary of the conference in a form of a policy brief. The brief will be distributed electronically to the Russian and EU policy and expert communities and displayed on partner web sites to ensure it reaches all the relevant audiences working in the field of EU-Russia relations.
